#### Genealogy Workshop for Beginners Saturdays, March 11 and March 25, 1:00-3:00 PM

The Holliston Historical Society will be offering a two-session Genealogy Workshop for Beginners. This workshop is geared to people who are just starting or think they might want to give genealogy a try. It will cover the basics including some of the various charts used to record your family tree, how to fill out a pedigree chart, and where and how to gather your information. At the end of the first session you will have a pedigree chart that you can start filling in (with pencil or pen).

The second session is two weeks later to give you some time to start your research at home. Session 2 will include help for some of the problems you have encountered and some resources available on the internet. By the end of session 2 (or even by the end of session 1) you may have decided whether genealogy is something you want to pursue.

Carol Kosicki will be conducting the workshop. The workshop is for members and guests (only one guest per member). Registration is required for planning purposes. If you can only attend the first session that is ok.

#### Town's 300th Anniversary in 2024

Thoughts on Holliston Historical Society's Participation

In March 2022, six Historical Society members met to brainstorm activities that could be implemented to support the Town's 300th Anniversary Celebration during 2024. After much discussion, the suggestions were narrowed to the following:

- 1. Participate in the parade (Saturday, May 18, 2024) with a float: either a horse-drawn carriage (restoration of one that is on display in the loft of the Historical Society barn) or construction of something on a flatbed truck. Invite Society members to walk alongside.
- 2. Strawberry Festival Sunday, June 23, 2024
  Make it a community event, setting up outside and in the barn.
  Make and sell strawberry shortcakes. Have live music performance. Offer children's activities such as face painting, fishing game, etc. Invite folks into the Asa Whiting House where exhibits will be set up.
- 3. For a fall date Coordinate with a group (or groups) who can present an 18th-century encampment or militia impression or reenactment along with demos of 18th-century tasks such as doing laundry and cooking, company drilling, children's drill, spinning wheel demo, setting up a sutlery (a store selling provisions to soldiers), etc.

If you would like to contribute your ideas to the planning, help in any way with any of the activities, or if you would like to take the lead on coordinating any event, please speak up! The members of the planning committee so far are Sheila Adams, Melissa Deutsch, Jane Gilfoy, Bea Hait, Pam Kyrka, Pat Pereira and Victoria Shotton. #### **COLLECTIONS COMMITTEE**

The Collections Committee now prepares a Society display at Town Hall every quarter on the first floor just outside the Town Administrator's office. We hope you'll check it out when you visit Town Hall. We've also completed installing all the new display cabinets in the House Meeting Room—funded by Gilfoy Art and Framing and a friend of the Society.

Last fall members of the Committee were invited to the Dennis Historical Society to learn how to make mannequins to display clothing from our collections. We plan on having some of our gowns on display during the Harvest Fair. We held two open houses—at the Harvest Fair (160 people, the most we've ever had come through) and for the Holidays on December 4 (78 visitors).


We deeply appreciate the grant from the Town of Holliston's Community Preservation Act fund (CPA) to pay for the cleaning and restoration of our portrait oil paintings. Once the work is completed, we will have a special display of the paintings for members and the public, including information about these early Hollistonians.

#### GRANT COMMITTEE

The Town of Holliston's American Rescue Plan Act Committee has granted the Historical Society \$25,000 for the replacement of our ancient and failing septic system. The new system should be in place by the end of April when the rental season begins. And the restoration of 2 ell doors is now in process, thanks to the Town's CPA fund. We are so grateful! Our next project is researching grants to sponsor new handicapped accessible bathrooms in the barn. Stay tuned!

#### **Smallpox in Holliston in 1833**

Is it too soon? Are you still reeling from the COVID-19 pandemic or would you like to read about how Holliston handled an outbreak of small-pox 190 years ago? This article was submitted by Joanne Hulbert who has 30 pages of medical history she could share with us. This editor is not sure of the source of this article, but is guessing it is quite old since it suggests that Mr. Rockwood, who was born in 1824, was still among the living at its writing.

An incident of note we here chronicle, occurred in the spring of 1833. Our relative, Elbridge Luther Rockwood, was seized with the malignant small pox. That he should recover, was regarded by the old and skilful family physician as little less than a miracle.

There were at that time thirteen occupants in the old family mansion, who were shut out from all society during seven long weeks. Many of the medical profession from abroad came to see the sick and learn relative to this malady. During its prevalence, the wants of the family were supplied at seemingly great hazard to the health and safety of the surrounding neighborhood. All were shut in, the roads fenced up, and all regular outward communication cut off! There was a place prominent and particular, where the family was permitted to make known its wants to those in waiting. This was at the top of the "Powder House Hill," so called. Here communications, written and verbal, were responded to from the valley below; and the various articles needed, allowed and called for, were in due time set down at the thither side of the fence full half a mile from the infected district. The house "with all its appurtenances thereunto belonging," was considered infected by this dread malady.

After the restoration of the sick, the house, with the various paraphernalia, including a heterogeneous assortment of odd and antique commodities in the old garret, were ordered to be cleaned by thorough washing, and the process completed by smoking in fumes of brimstone. The place of purification was a small shop hard by the house. Our worthy town officials for the time being, to make things all right, "on a set day" entered and examined the premises and pronounced them clean and safe, every whit.

Thus ended the history of the small pox in Holliston in 1833. "A consummation most devoutly wished" by the whole town.
